FIRST DAY—Morning Session.

Tuesday, October 17, 1899.

The Missouri Baptist General Association assembled in its sixty-fifth annual session in the meeting house of the First Baptist church of Joplin, Missouri, in accordance with the adjournment at Kirksville, October 20, 1898.

Moderator E. W. Stephens called the meeting to order. He read the Ninetieth Psalm and offered prayer.

Rev. W. Pope Yeaman moved that permanent organization be proceeded with. The motion prevailed.

The moderator appointed Alpha Ingle, Jos. Flory, H. P. Smith, Everette Gill and Jos. H. Guyett tellers for the election.

Rev. James Reid moved that the ballot prepared by the secretary be used and that all officers be voted for at one time. It was so ordered.

The election resulted as follows: Moderator, E. W. Stephens; assistant moderator, J. F. Kemper; secretary, A. W. Payne; auditor, J. L. Applegate.

Rev. Milford Riggs delivered the address of welcome.

At the request of the moderator Rev. J. C. Armstrong responded.

Rev. W. T. Campbell moved and the association ordered that Brethren H. N. Bouey and J. Goins present the educational and missionary claims of the colored Baptists of Missouri. An offering of \$77.95 was made.

Adjourned with prayer by Rev. James M. Smith.

TUESDAY—Afternoon Session.

Rev. G. W. Hyde led the devotional service.

The moderator appointed the committee on nominations: N. M. Givan, G. L. Black, A. E. Rogers, W. J. Williamson, E. H. Sawyer, R. P. Johnston, J. L. Applegate and R. L. Davidson.

It having been discovered that by the terms of the constitution no assistant moderator was elected at the election this morning Noah M. Givan moved that the secretary cast the ballot of the association for Rev. J. F. Kemper as assistant moderator. Rev. W. J. Patrick seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously adopted and the secretary cast the ballot.

Rev. J. F. Kemper moved that the order be suspended in order that he might introduce a resolution to amend the Rules of Order. The motion was carried.

Brother Kemper moved to amend Rules of Order, paragraph 3, after "in accordance with," substitute for "Mell's Manual of Parliamentary Practice," the words "Parliamentary Law, by F. H. Kerfoot, L. B., LL. D." The motion was unanimously carried.

Rev. T. L. West, corresponding secretary of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools, read the report of that board as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF STATE MISSIONS AND SUNDAY
SCHOOLS OF THE MISSOURI BAPTIST GENERAL
ASSOCIATION.

It is with a feeling of profound gratitude to God that we, the State Mission Board, are permitted to complete another year's work, and to make our report to this body.

The past year has been one that presented some peculiar difficulties, as well as some marked triumphs in our work. The phenomenally long and hard winter so interfered with all church work that during the first six months of the year the total contributions of all the churches for State Missions did not amount to quite two thousand dollars, while the expenses for the same period amounted to about six thousand. During this same period the operations of our Missionaries were also much hindered.

With the beginning of the third quarter, however, the corresponding secretary made an appeal to the churches to come to the aid of the Board, stating plainly the condition of affairs. The general response that the churches and Sunday Schools made to this call was gratifying indeed. At the close of the third quarter enough money had been sent in to pay all expenses for that quarter.

In spite of a debt, a part of which was brought over from last year, we entered the fourth quarter with hopeful hearts. Nothing that

could be thought of for the furtherance of the work was left undone, and God has rewarded our efforts.

As we look over the condition of our work to-day, we see several things which call for special mention, and for thankfulness to God:

(1) First among these is the larger spirit of fellowship and unity existing among our brotherhood. This was very noticeably apparent in nearly all of our district associations.

(2) The large increase in the number of churches co-operating in our work this year. The increase in the receipts this year over last arises from this source rather than from an increase in the contributions from the churches heretofore contributing. To us there is no feature of our work that is more hopeful than this.

(3) The advance made in our Sunday School work. About the beginning of the year the Board perfected an agreement with the American Baptist Publication Society, by which they secured the efficient services of Bro. Charles Rhoads, who, since the last of January, has been working in Missouri as Sunday School Missionary under the direction of our State Board. His work has been largely that of organization, along which lines he has accomplished good results. (See his report.) The Board asks the hearty co-operation of all our churches and workers with Bro. Rhoads in his efforts to make this important department of our work what it ought to be. We hereby desire to express our high appreciation of the Society's work.

(4) The inauguration of a plan of "Volunteer Mission Work," by which many of our pastors agree to give as much as ten days a year for three years, to holding protracted meetings where the Board may direct. In this arrangement the Board agrees to pay all the necessary expenses of the men, and they agree, at some favorable time during the meeting, to take a collection for State Missions. Under this arrangement, ten meetings have been held during the summer and fall, with good results (see tabulated report), and nineteen others have been arranged for. This plan of work has accomplished almost marvelous things in another state, and we believe it will do great good in Missouri.

THE POLICY OF THE BOARD.

The Board, at its first meeting last year, determined to follow the same plan of work it pursued during the previous year, viz., to place four men as General Missionaries in the four quarters of the state respectively—to co-operate with our German, Swede, and negro associations—to co-operate as far as possible with our district associations, and to aid weak churches in sustaining their pastors. In carrying out this plan the Board employed during the year, fifty-two men, who were placed, and reported work as follows:

At the close of the first quarter the Taylor Avenue Church, St. Louis, became self-sustaining, and declared that they would not further need the aid of the Board.

DEBT PAYING.

Few things are more blighting to the growth and usefulness of a church than a church debt. Be rejoiced, therefore, that the past year has been one of church debt paying amongst us.

Cameron.—This church has been laboring for many years under a debt of about \$2,000. During the year their pastor, Rev. J. S. Davis, with the efficient aid of Bro. L. E. Martin, secured in good notes about \$1,800 of this amount, on condition that the whole amount be raised. At present it seems that the whole subscription will be lost for want of the \$200 that is lacking to pay off the whole \$2,000.

Grant City.—This church had a debt of about \$800, which threatened to destroy its usefulness if not to blot out its existence. With Bro. Martin's assistance they paid off the incumbrance and are now rejoicing in the liberty of freedom from debt.

Tower Grove, St. Louis, has during the year entirely paid off a burdensome debt.

Joplin.—Under the efficient leadership of pastor Riggs, this church has completed its house of worship at an additional cost of \$2,200, and paid \$4,000 on their debt, leaving \$2,500 still unpaid. They now have a church property worth \$25,000.

CONVERSIONS.

We note with sorrow that the year has not been one of great ingathering. No Missionary nor Mission church has reported a great revival. This reminds us again that "Paul may plant and Apollos may water, but God must give the increase." We trust however that good seeds have been sown, from which we shall yet reap an abundant harvest.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

We desire again to express our conviction that the great need of Missouri Baptists is the development of our churches in Christian work. We need not *more* churches, but *better* churches. Too many of our churches are satisfied with the old "once-a-month" preaching. Too few of our pastors give their people sufficient information on Missions to arouse in their hearts and minds any intelligent enthusiasm.

For the betterment of this state of affairs we recommend: 1st. That the pastors of our churches systematically give their people information concerning each department of our Mission work.

2d. That the corresponding secretary secure the very best man possible in each district association to look after the interest of State Missions and to be a medium of communication with the churches in his association on this subject.

3d. That the General Association appoint a statistical secretary, whose duty it shall be to furnish all possible statistical information concerning our churches for publication in the minutes.

TUESDAY—Evening Session.

Rev. M. D. Eubank led the devotional service.

At 7:30 the moderator asked Rev. S. H. Ford to lead in prayer.

The singing of the association was in charge of Bro. W. G. Tyzzer. He used "The Chord" published by the American Baptist Publication Society.

By special request of Rev. J. D. Biggs, the preacher of the evening, Rev. S. G. Neil and wife sang "I Shall Know Him."

Rev. J. F. Kemper read selections from the twentieth chapter of the Gospel by John.

Rev. J. D. Biggs, of Bowling Green, preached the introductory sermon from the text:

"Then saith He to Thomas, Reach thither thy finger and behold My hands; and reach thither thy hand and thrust it into My side; and be not faithless but believing.

"And Thomas answered and said unto Him, my Lord and my God, Jesus saith unto him, Thomas, because thou hast seen Me thou hast believed; blessed are they that have not seen and yet have believed."

Subject:—"Christ conquering unbelief."

At the close of the sermon Rev. W. Pope Yeaman offered prayer.

The next order was the report of the committee on the

BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME.

The cry of an orphan is a universal speech heard and heeded by every heart that cherishes still the milk of human kindness. These helpless little ones, the innocent victims of sin or misfortune, can not plead in vain for sympathy. With no record of wrongdoing to contradict their prayer for help, and with no resource but a cry, they come to beg for our prayers and our practical pity. We must either take care of them or turn away our faces in unfeeling silence. There were in our Baptist Orphans' Home one year ago fifty-one children. During the year seventy-four more were received. Six have been adopted into private homes, seven are in prospective homes on trial, two have died, and fifty-three remain in the Home. A school is maintained for their education, and as far as possible they are taught in housekeeping and home duties. The expense for supporting the Home for the year has been \$3,802.42, or about \$317 a month.

One year ago there was reported on hand an endowment fund of \$8,008.84. The General Association then recommended the raising of \$10,000 additional endowment, suggesting gifts of at least one dollar each from among all the friends of the institution. A committee was appointed to receive these gifts. No agency has been employed because the committee hoped that this easy sum might be given spontaneously and without cost of collection. The movement has not been a failure, nor has it yet reached the proportions of success. There have been added to the endowment since the last annual report \$1,107.54 in cash and \$600 in notes, making an addition of \$1,707.54. This is only seventeen per cent of the sum asked for. We recommend that the committee be authorized to continue their efforts to complete this sum, using such means as their judgment may recommend to bring it to success.

We renew to individuals, Sunday Schools and churches an admonition to contribute their regular offerings to the expense fund of the institution. And this we can do the more cordially because of the

tireless, faithful zeal of the good women who constitute its Board of Managers.

WEDNESDAY—Morning Session.

Rev. S. P. Brite led the devotional service.

At the reassembling of the association Rev. Charles Manly offered prayer.

The first order was the report of the committee on revision of constitution. The committee reported, through Rev. M. J. Breaker, chairman, that it had no recommendations to make.

Rev. M. J. Breaker gave notice that at the next annual meeting he would offer for adoption the following amendment to the

CONSTITUTION.

I hereby give notice that next year I will offer the following amendments to the Constitution: Make article 6 read thus:

Any church of like faith which may contribute ten dollars to the State Mission and Sunday School work of this body shall be entitled to a representative and to an additional representative for every five dollars; and every association auxiliary to this body shall be entitled to representation on the same terms as churches, or be entitled to one representative for every one hundred dollars spent in missionary work upon its own field; provided that no church or association shall be entitled to more than five representatives.

Strike out all else that relates to the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools and all that relates to the Board of Home and Foreign Missions and insert the following, and correct numbering:

The Board of Missions shall consist of twenty-four members, and shall have charge of State Missions (including Sunday School and colportage work) and of raising and forwarding funds for Home and Foreign Missions under the Missouri plan. It shall have authority to call special meetings of this body and in the interim between the sessions of this General Association this Board shall be its executive. It shall elect its own officers and agents, all of whom, with its missionaries, must be members in good standing in some Missouri Baptist church.

The Board of Missions shall meet twice a year, the first time within three weeks after the adjournment of each annual meeting of this body, in St. Louis; the second time, on the day before each annual meeting and at the place thereof.

At its first meeting the Board shall elect officers and agents and arrange its plans for the ensuing year. Its work in the interim between its meetings it shall commit to committees as follows: State Missions, to nine members, living at or near Kansas City; Sunday Schools, to seven members living at or near Columbia; Home and Foreign Missions to eight members living in or near St. Louis.

These committees shall meet every two months or oftener, and shall execute the work committed to them by the Board, but shall in no case have authority to exceed these commissions. They shall elect their own officers and shall make to the Board full reports of their operations. Any one of them may call special meetings of the whole Board.

The Board of Missions shall appoint annually a Women's Central Committee of Missions, which shall promote the interests of Missions among our Missouri Baptist women.

Rev. J. C. Maple offered the following report which was adopted:

DR. YEAMAN'S HISTORY.

Report of committee to superintend the publication of Dr. Yeaman's History of General Association. Your committee report: Immediately after the meeting of this body at Kirksville, we appointed W. F. Elliott to take charge of all the work this body assigned to us. He thereupon did all the work and did it successfully, and therefore deserves the credit of having the history published according to the instructions given the committee by the General Association.

Rev. M. J. Breaker moved that the secretary be instructed to have printed 10,000 copies of the minutes of this association and that he distribute them thoroughly through-

out the state. He afterward moved that the secretary have \$100 for his services. The motion was unanimously adopted.

The discussion of the report of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools was resumed and spoken to by J. S. Kirtley, W. J. Williamson, R. P. Johnston, W. T. Campbell, J. T. M. Johnston, T. M. S. Kenney, J. C. Pollard, S. M. Brown and T. L. West.

A collection of \$255 was taken to remove the debt on the meeting house at Cameron.

A free will offering for State Missions was taken amounting to \$340.22. Report adopted.

Adjourned with prayer by Rev. J. E. Norvell.

WEDNESDAY—Afternoon Session.

Rev. E. H. Sawyer led in prayer.

The moderator called for the report of the Board of Home and Foreign Missions. Secretary E. V. Kyte read the report.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS FOR FISCAL YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1899.

With profound gratitude to God for his undeserved favor, your Board submits this, its tenth annual report.

The year just closing has been a prosperous one, obstacles, even serious ones, have not been lacking, but the grace of God has brought success.

The corresponding secretary, Dr. Manly J. Breaker, has filled this office again this year, and gives the following summary of his work:

The books of the corresponding secretary and the treasurer have been examined by the committee on finance and found correct.

We bear cheerful testimony to the efficiency and faithfulness with which our corresponding secretary and his assistants have performed the arduous duties of his office.

THE TREASURER.

Dr. E. H. Sawyer is an admirable treasurer. He is thoroughly painstaking and accurate. His great amount of work is very largely a labor of love, for his salary is merely nominal.

His office is in the same room as that of the corresponding secretary, and thus these two officers can frequently compare items and so secure the perfect accuracy with which they handle the affairs of the Board.

REMITTANCES

To the general boards are greater this year than any year since the Carey Centennial.

Throughout the whole country there has been a steady and marked decline in annual offerings for Home and Foreign Missions, from the Carey Centennial in 1895 until to-day. In Missouri, however, that decline was arrested last year.

At the general meeting last May, Missouri was one of the few states reporting increased contributions. Its increase to the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention far exceeded the combined increase of all the other states reporting an increase.

EXPENSES.

As to the expenses of our work the following ratios of expense to total collections are instructive:

In 1886, 46 per cent; 1891, 26 per cent; 1893, 24 per cent; 1896, 30 per cent; 1899, 19 per cent.

A GREATER GROWTH.

A still greater growth of interest in Home and Foreign Missions is to be seen in the fact that in the past year the Mayfield Sanitarium and the Blue River Association have undertaken the support of missionaries; the former Bro. J. W. Lowe, and the latter Bro. J. L. Downing and Bro. M. D. Eubank; and there are cheering indications that these noble examples are soon to be followed by other brethren.

A STILL GREATER GROWTH.

In the past two years Missouri has come right to the front in the number of Baptists who have gone out from her to preach the Gospel abroad. Some dozen and a half of these noble brethren and sisters now represent us in other lands, where one-fourth of a century ago we had but two.

THE FUTURE ✓

Is bright but requires much work and earnest devotion.

Our worthy and efficient fellow workers, the Missouri Baptist Women's Missionary Society, which has in the past received such signal approval of God on its work, sends to us this year a memorial which accompanies this report.

We heartily recommend that a committee be appointed to whom that memorial shall be referred, and that that committee be instructed to report thereon at its earliest convenience.

THE GREATEST WORK BEFORE US

Is not the raising of sums of money for the great causes committed to our hands, but the development of the vast body of our churches in missionary interest and efficiency.

This great and noble task our Board can not do alone. This year the secretaries of our two Boards now have an understanding by which a wise and effective system of harmonious action has been reached, and which, if carried out, will greatly aid in this great work. We recommend that this body give its hearty approval to the plan of co-operation and development proposed and urge upon its Boards to unite with such vigor that the new century shall see a systematic plan adopted throughout the state.

Thus will be introduced a new era for which we should all earnestly pray and labor. By order of the Board. E. V. KYTE, Secretary.

ADDENDUM I.

Whereas there was appointed last year a committee on Missionary celebration of the close of the century, and whereas the chairman and one other member of that committee are absent, we recommend the General Association to reappoint that committee, asking Bro. West and Bro. Breaker to serve on it.

ADDENDUM II.

To the Missouri Baptist General Association:

DEAR BRETHREN:—We, the members of the Missouri Baptist Woman's Missionary Society, assembled in our annual meeting this twenty-first day of April, 1899, at Hannibal, Missouri, feeling that there is a widespread misunderstanding of our aim and spirit, and that

because of this, and perhaps other reasons, very many of our pastors and leaders oppose our work, desire to set before you the following facts:

As many of you know, this Society was organized some twenty-two years ago for the avowed purpose of aiding in the Foreign Mission work of the Southern Baptist Convention. While not authorized by, nor organically connected with the General Association, its leaders were loyal Baptists, attending the meetings of that body and interested in its work. They sought the sympathy and support of the great Baptist brotherhood by personal appeal and by each year sending a report of their work to the General Association. The Society not being organically connected with the Association and possibly for other reasons, these reports, while for some time tolerated, were evidently regarded as something foreign to the work of the body.

However, at Carthage in 1885, the General Association gave recognition to the work by adopting the following:

Resolved, That a committee of five ladies be appointed to correspond with the Baptist sisterhood throughout the state to induce them to enlarge the scope of their beneficence so as to include other than Foreign Missions."

The committee was appointed. They carried out the instruction of the Association to the best of their ability, and, at the next meeting of the Association reported that there was expressed a general willingness on the part of the sisters to comply with the request to enlarge the scope of the work. At the meeting of the Society the same year a committee was appointed to revise the constitution so as to adapt it to the enlarged work.

For twelve years the annual meetings of the Society were held during the sessions of the General Association, though during the later of those years complaints were made by certain brethren because the women withdrew from the congregation to hold their meetings. For some years, too, complaints were made that the large attendance of women at the meetings of the Association made the crowd too great; and at Clinton in 1888 this complaint was made on the floor of the General Association. Accordingly at the meeting of the Society held at that time and place, the matter of holding the annual meetings of the Society at a different time from those of the General Association was considered and it was decided to adopt that course in future.

When the General Association, at the meeting in Jefferson City in 1889, adopted what is known as the "Missouri Plan," the Society at once passed a resolution to adjust its work to that plan, transmit its funds through the state agencies, receive money for any Board, or object and disburse it according to the instructions of the donor, undesignated money for Home and Foreign Missions to be paid to the Boards to which the Society was originally auxiliary. It is claimed that a mistake was made in organizing such a work independent of the General Association; but the above recital of facts is sufficient to show that it was not the intention of those who inaugurated the work nor of those who have kept it up to do aught to offend or grieve the members of the General Association, to whom we have looked and do still look as leaders and advisers; but, on the contrary, in every case have shown a readiness to comply with advice or suggestion from the General Association.

While we feel that our Society has been a great educator in Missions to the women of our churches, and has aroused much interest in this so sadly neglected work, and collected for its support many thousands of dollars that would otherwise have been spent on perishable things, yet we realize that our plans have been far from perfect. And, inasmuch as the object of our organization has been greatly hindered by the disfavor above referred to and because we do not desire to prosecute our work in a way that is felt to be out of harmony with the work of the churches, we come to you for advice as to what we shall do in the future; and we beg that you will appoint a committee to confer with us as to the adoption of a plan that will give the General Association such oversight of the work as will commend it to the confidence and support of pastors without which its success is greatly hindered.

RECEIPTS FOR HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

An itemized statement of these receipts will be found in the statistical report prepared by the secretary of the General Association and published in the table "Missionary Exhibit." Please note well that the fiscal year of the Board of Home and Foreign Missions closes

with September 30th every year, so that all receipts after that date go to the account of the ensuing year. This good rule is made necessary by the complicated nature of our work, which requires much time to prepare an accurate report.

The expressions "several churches" and "anonymous" cover receipts which the senders did not sufficiently designate to enable me to learn the names of the churches and other donors. Under "miscellaneous" I have put contributions which bore no indication of the association.

The number of churches represented in the offerings: for Home Missions is about 585 (against 461 last year); to Foreign Missions 675 (against 479 last year). The gross receipts are for Home Missions \$6,912.92 (against \$5,355.18 last year); for Foreign Missions \$9,400.32 (against \$8,182.33 last year). The total receipts this year are \$16,313.34, a gain of \$2,775.83. I give profound thanks to Almighty God and to his dear people.

Included in the above receipts (and indicated in the report) are the following valuable offerings from our noble Missouri Baptist women. For Woman's Home Mission Society, Chicago, \$275.70; for Woman's Foreign Mission Society, Chicago, \$903.88; from the Missouri Baptist Woman's Missionary Society for Home Missions (Atlanta Board) \$528.49; for Foreign Missions (Richmond Board) \$1,049.30—total from our sisters \$2,757.30, a large gain over last year.

I beseech all who love these great causes to pray often for them, and not to forget the trembling hands to which they are committed in our state.

AS LIBRARIAN.

No notable additions have been made to your library during the past year, except two copies of Dr. Yeaman's excellent work, the History of the General Association; The Central Baptist, two copies; The

Word and Way, one copy; The Baptist Flag, one copy; The Western Recorder, one copy; The Examiner (New York), one copy, are received weekly. The Foreign Mission Journal; The Seminary Magazine; the William Jewell Student, monthly. These appear with due regularity. The Minutes of the General Association; the minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention; the catalogue of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary; and the catalogue of William Jewell College are received at their respective times.

The minutes of the various District Associations come at their proper times, *if the clerk does not forget us*. There are many Associations whose clerks never fail to send their minutes, but there are many more by whom we are never remembered. To get these last sometimes gives us much trouble, and often we fail entirely. Fugitive catalogues and pamphlets often come to us and are cared for by the librarian.

Although frequent appeal has been made, we have thus far failed to call forth anything like a general response to our demand for publications by Baptists in Missouri. Tracts, pamphlets, books, song books, schemes of church work, programs—anything that will serve to show what the Baptists of Missouri are doing—either in a small or in a large way—will be placed where they may become the source of valuable information for generations following.

William Jewell College has generously prepared a fire-proof vault, the use of which it gives us free of cost. Through your liberality of last year, your treasurer (see report below) has been enabled to put this vault into excellent condition, and your archives are now not only safely, but elegantly housed.

Your librarian invites you to visit us at William Jewell College and inspect the Depository of the Archives of the Missouri Baptist Historical Society.

A WORD EXPLANATORY.

The fact that I have allowed my expenditures to exceed the amount in the treasury by \$32.11, requires a word of explanation. At the time of the fire at William Jewell four years ago, the papers, books, and records belonging to the Historical Society were piled promiscuously in a safe but unsuitable place, and as we had no place where we could safely and in an orderly way bestow them, they lay there in disorder until in making improvements in the college building it became necessary that this receptacle be emptied. So, although the funds in the treasury had been exhausted in furnishing the vault, in order to avoid the expense and trouble of twice handling, I decided to have all the work done at once in a correct manner, pay the amount myself, and let the brethren reimburse me if they thought best.

From this time on the expense of caring for the archives will be moderate. Now, if the brethren will unite with me in collecting material for the archives, we shall soon have a collection of valuable material that will form an effective nucleus for the great Baptist Historical Library of the west.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF WILLIAM JEWELL COLLEGE.

DEAR BRETHREN:—By the mercies of God we again meet you with our annual report.

The attendance last session was 316, of whom 124 were approved for the gospel ministry. A class of 34 graduated last June, one with the degree of Master of Arts, and 33 with that of Bachelor of Arts.

The work of the session as reported by the president at commencement meeting was highly gratifying to the trustees. Since our meeting at Kirksville death has claimed another one of the "Old Guard," Dr. W. R. Rothwell, whose death was to the community at large a calamity and to the college and church a source of deepest grief.

With this exception the health of faculty and students was uniformly good.

During the summer extensive improvements were made, had to be, could not longer be delayed. Jewell Hall was remodeled inside and outside, a new library room provided on the first floor with reading room, Ely Hall, Vardeman Hall and the cottages repaired and painted, Wornall Hall finished on interior including the seating of the chapel with chairs—at a cost of about \$4,000. The College Hill is now a beauty to behold—an ideal place for enlargement of vision and inspiration to noble deeds.

The present session opened well, more new students than usual. The entire enrollment to date is 317, and still they come. The class of young men is constantly improving, further advanced and better prepared to do college work. We are now in great need of more teachers, but can not support them without additional endowment. We must have the \$200,000 asked for as soon as possible. One hundred and fifteen of the present attendants are ministerial students and the number will doubtless reach 125, possibly 130, before the end of the session. The treasurer's report will show definitely the financial condition of the college.

Since we made our last report to you the Ministerial Education Society has suffered great loss in the death of our consecrated president and treasurer, Rev. William R. Rothwell, D. D. He departed this life on December 28, 1898.

It is needless for us to say to those congregated here that we greatly miss Dr. Rothwell's wise counsel and conservative judgment.

He was always courteous, kind and liberal in his rulings, and genial in his intercourse with his colleagues; a man of rare catholicity of spirit, he made no enemies—of consistent Christian charitableness, he made many friends. He died in the Lord and his works do follow him.

During last year the Society had under its supervising care 124 students, preparing for the ministry, in William Jewell College. This year 119 have already matriculated. This gives promise of 125 or 130 before the close of the year.

The number of ministerial students has now far outgrown the number for which the Vardeman Fund made provision. The income from this fund will now barely meet the tuition of 52 students. The College bears the burden of the remaining 75 or 80, in addition to the expense of the courtesy extended to the sons of ministers, of whom 18 are now attending the College.

Your secretary recommended in his report to the June meeting that the Ministerial Educational Society take some steps toward assuming the responsibility of the tuition of the excess. This matter was thoroughly discussed and finally it was unanimously voted that

we ask the churches to give at least one-half this deficit. This half will amount to \$1,500. If the churches respond it will bring great relief to the College and react upon the Ministerial Department to its great advantage.

With gratitude to the Lord for the great degree of prosperity granted, we submit this report.

The religious press is not behind the secular in providing healthful instruction, and that seasoned with divine grace. We rejoice that our own denomination is not a whit behind the foremost in publishing good literature, and we may compete with any in prices, and heartily recommend Baptist literature for Baptist homes, thoroughly convinced not only that none is better, but none so good.

1. For Baptist families in Missouri we recommend only such denominational periodicals as yield a no-doubtful support to all the general interests fostered by this body, and give no uncertain sound in matters of Bible doctrine.

2. For Sunday Schools we recommend the literature of the Sunday School Board at Nashville and that of the Publication Society.

3. As to Mission literature (1) on the subject of Home Missions, "The Home Field," of Atlanta, Ga., and "The Home Mission Monthly," of New York; (2) Foreign Missions, "The Baptist Missionary Magazine," and "The Kingdom," of Boston, and "The Foreign Mission Journal," of Richmond.

4. We recommend further that our board of Home and Foreign Missions be requested to devise some plan by which the facts in Baptist Missionary operations, both at home and abroad, may be brought into our state without making it either a field of contest for our Boards, or one where two crops must be sown to reap one harvest; in other words, Mission literature for Missouri to suit the Missouri Plan.

Report adopted.

Rev. G. W. Hatcher, secretary of the Board of Curators of Stephens College, read that report.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CURATORS OF STEPHENS COLLEGE.

Stephens College is doing excellent work. The enrollment is as large as it was last year; the faculty is stronger than it has ever been under the present administration, and the possibilities of the college, with proper management, and with the ardent support of its friends, are greater than ever before. We, your board, to whom you have en-

trusted the management of the institution, ask your active sympathy, and hearty cooperation in making this college what it should be, as your representative among the female schools of the land. We think you ought to take steps at once to increase its endowment, to more fully equip its laboratories and to enlarge its buildings; also, to provide a fund whereby worthy Baptist girls, and especially the daughters of Baptist ministers, may be aided in educating themselves. By way of emphasizing the fact that as a board, we have the right to bring these matters to you, and that we have no other human power to which we may appeal, we call your attention to the legal relation existing between this body, the General Association of Missouri Baptists, and Stephens College.

From the deed of Baptist College to Stephens College: "This indenture made and entered into on this the 8th day of October, 1873, by and between Columbia Baptist Female College, party of the first part, and Stephens College, a corporation duly organized under the general corporation laws of the State of Missouri, and under the control of the Missionary Baptist Church of the State of Missouri, party of the second part, Witnesseth, That, for and in consideration of the uses and purposes hereinafter named, and one dollar, lawful money of the United States, the party of the first part doth hereby give, grant, and confirm unto the party of the second part, the following described real estate," (here follows description of the property) "it being hereby distinctly understood and agreed that this conveyance of the property aforesaid is hereby made by the party of the first part, to the end, intent, and purpose, that the said property shall be only and solely used by the party of the second part, under the auspices, supervision, direction and control of the denomination of Christians, known as the Missionary, or Regular Baptists, in the State of Missouri, and now represented by the organic body known as the General Association of Missouri Baptists."

From the deed of J. L. Stephens and wife to Stephens College: "This indenture made and entered into, on this the 22nd day of October, A. D. 1877, by and between James L. Stephens and Amelia Stephens, his wife, both of the county of Boone, State of Missouri, party of the first part, and the Curators of Stephens College, representatives of the Baptist General Association of the State of Missouri, party of the second part, Witnesseth, That, for and in consideration of the sum of one dollar, and to comply with and fulfill all the obligations of the party of the first part of the aforesaid College, doth hereby grant, bargain, sell, convey and confirm unto the party of the second part, the following described lots, or parcels of real estate"—here follows a lengthy description of sixteen houses and lots, valued at \$20,000, and which had cost Bro. Stephens \$24,000.—"To have and to hold the above described real estate, as above, unto the party of the second part

forever, for the uses and purposes herein set forth, and not otherwise."

Article II of the Charter: "The object for which this Corporation is formed is to receive, establish, build up, perpetuate, and hold in trust for the General Baptist Association of Missouri, in the town of Columbia, Boone county, Missouri, a First Class College in which all the higher branches of literary, scientific, and classical education shall be taught; and with powers to confer upon young ladies graduating at said College, all the literary, scientific, and honorary Degrees usually conferred by similar Institutions."

Article III of the Charter: "The affairs of said College shall be managed by the undersigned Curators, who shall have power to adopt By-Laws for their own government, in which their own term of office shall be fixed, and in which provision shall also be made for appointing their successors."

By-Law (1) "The Curators of this College shall be appointed by the Missouri Baptist General Association as provided for on the 17th page of the Minutes of that Body for the year A. D. 1870."

Article VII of the Charter: "The said Curators shall have power to adopt all measures deemed by them necessary for the best interests of the corporation; and may adopt such By-Laws as they may deem expedient, not inconsistent with these Articles of Association and the Instructions of the Missouri Baptist General Association and not in conflict with the Constitution of the United States and the State of Missouri."

These excerpts from Deeds, Charter and By-Laws show, beyond a doubt, that this "now truly magnificent property" belongs to all the Baptists of Missouri, as represented by the General Association, that it is held in trust for the General Association by a Board of Curators, which must and can be appointed only by the General Association, which can adopt no measure that is contrary to, or inconsistent with, the instructions of the General Association; and the conclusion is, therefore, that Stephens College is just as absolutely, and inalienably, and everlastingly a Baptist Institution, and the property of all the Baptists of Missouri, as it is possible to make it under the laws of this great State.

In view of this relation as shown by these legal documents, we are constrained to believe that this General Association should feel a deeper interest in this college and be more actively and earnestly for it than for any other female college in this land. As long as this relation exists, this Association must seek to build up and perpetuate this college, or violate obligations that grow out of a relation which has been voluntarily assumed.

We, to whom you from year to year commit this great interest, and from whom you expect, and of whom you demand an annual re-

port, earnestly ask you to aid us in doing what we are seeking to accomplish for you, to wit: To enlarge the building, to better equip its laboratories, to increase its endowment, and raise a fund to assist Baptist girls in getting an education, and to aid us in reaching the Baptists throughout the state by giving it here and now your highest possible sanction. We feel the need of this. Hitherto, agents sent out by your board, have been chilled and humiliated by the fact that this body has been slow to take hold of this work. The apathy of the parent toward the child has made it exceedingly difficult to interest the brotherhood in the child's behalf. Standing as she does, the friend of all and the foe of none, with no rival or competitor in point of legal relation, Stephens College asks, through her Board of Curators, the help of this body, and the prayers and sympathies of all who are interested in the higher Christian education of girls.

The report was discussed by G. W. Hatcher, W. J. Patrick, S. A. Northrop, G. L. Black and J. O'B. Lowry.

It was ordered that a committee of seven be appointed to devise a plan for the endowment of Stephens College and to report to this body next year. The moderator appointed G. L. Black, Everette Gill, J. F. Cook, J. S. Kirtley, J. O'B. Lowry, T. L. West and R. P. Johnston.

The report was then adopted.

According to the recommendation of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools, the association decided to elect a statistical secretary to do the work suggested by the board. A. W. Payne was elected unanimously.

Dr. E. H. Sawyer read the report of the Board of Education as follows:

SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Board of Education was organized in 1893 upon the recommendation of an educational committee appointed by the General Association. The Constitution provides that "the Board of Education shall thoroughly investigate the conditions and wants of all our denominational schools in Missouri, and shall have power to organize an auxiliary board of women to aid in raising money, and to raise money to afford temporary relief and to endow any Baptist school in

Missouri. The said Board of Education shall make yearly reports to the Association of its doings and of the operations and finances of the schools co-operating with the said Board of Education." Acting under this authority the board of nineteen members organized by the election of W. M. Senter, president; E. W. Stephens, vice-president; A. D. Brown, treasurer; Ernest Cook, recording secretary. Subsequently E. H. Sawyer, not a member of the board, was chosen corresponding secretary, and directed to go in person to each of the schools, reporting to the General Association, and to work out on the ground all the questions necessary to a full and complete understanding of the educational situation in the state. Funds for the defraying of expenses of this work were chiefly subscribed by members of the board; but additional funds were raised on the field by the secretary while pursuing the duties assigned him. Copies of deeds to property and charters of institutions were obtained from the different schools and are now on file in the office of the corresponding secretary. Additional information has been obtained from these schools from time to time, and conveyed to the General Association through the annual reports of the board. The objects, set forth in the circular issued by order of the board and extensively circulated by its secretary, were:

1. To quicken interest in our denominational schools.
2. To unify the educational interests of our denomination, under the patronage of the General Association.
3. To help schools under immediate and pressing needs.
4. To aid in providing endowment for all our colleges.

Assured by the deeds and charters of these institutions that they were firmly and safely allied to the denomination, the board announced their intention to give the moral support of the General Association to such approved institutions as might seek indorsement in an appeal to the churches, for temporary aid or in an effort to increase endowment funds. The order of help was to be determined by the need of the schools and their importance as centers of denominational influence. Following the meeting of the last General Association, the Curators of Stephens College decided to undertake the raising of \$20,000 for a new Conservatory building; \$50,000 endowment to aid ministers' daughters in securing a college education, and to solicit \$100,000 as a general endowment fund. They submitted their plan to the Board of Education and asked its endorsement, and the assignment of the corresponding secretary to service in aid of President Taylor in raising funds for the above purposes.

The application was approved and the secretary began work January 1, 1899, advocating the movement for the benefit of Stephens College. An Educational Jubilee service was arranged for and held at

the Second Baptist church in St. Louis. By courtesy of the manager and editor of the Central Baptist, an educational number of that paper was issued. Several of the ablest educators and leading pastors in the state were thus heard and read by those who did themselves the honor to participate in the jubilee service, or peruse the paper. In pursuit of his work the corresponding secretary has traveled 8,928 miles, preached 56 sermons, written many letters and issued circulars to pastors and others in the interest of this work. He has raised \$1,574.91 in cash and pledges, and has promise of several hundred dollars, conditioned upon the completing of the fund for the Conservatory building by January 1, 1900.

It is the opinion of the secretary that the women of the state could easily supply the funds for the proposed building, and that an effort for the college, to raise \$50,000 endowment to furnish aid to ministers' daughters in acquiring an education would meet with popular favor.

The gratifying reports of William Jewell and Stephens Colleges are before you; the board desires further to charge your minds with the weighty responsibility of Missouri Baptists toward the eleven other institutions reporting to this body which matriculate more than two-thirds the number of students enrolled in our schools.

Hardin College is fortunate in being well founded. Governor Hardin built for the future. As the years go by the wisdom of the founder becomes more and more clearly manifest. The endowment fund is constantly growing. It increased \$2,000 the past year, making the total interest bearing endowment fund \$62,600.

The present year has opened well. The present enrollment is 195, of which 130 are boarding students and 65 day students. These students come chiefly from Missouri, Arkansas, Kansas and Texas. This year, so far, nine (9) states and territories are represented among the students.

The enrollment the past year was the largest in the history of the college, 166 boarding students, 88 day students; total, 254.

During the past four years the curriculum has been thoroughly revised. It now embraces an elementary course of Bible study as a requirement for graduation in literary courses.

We realize that we need more endowment, more buildings and more extensive equipment. The endowment should be increased by \$100,000, and another building costing \$30,000 should be erected as soon as possible.

Baptist Female College at Lexington, Missouri, has entered upon its 45th session. The college was never more prosperous than at present. There are 127 pupils enrolled in the school, of whom 90 are boarding pupils. A new Musical Conservatory has been recently

added. In this department there are 85 pupils in piano music; 34 in voice culture and 7 in stringed instruments. The college buildings have been enlarged and beautified this last summer at an expense of \$10,000. James A. Beauchamp, A. M., is president.

Webb City College, Milford Riggs, president. This institution, now in the fourth and most prosperous year of its existence, is the property of the Spring River Baptist Association. Its trustees, all of whom are Baptists, are elected by the association, thus bringing the college into closest touch with our denominational life. The college is located in the very heart of the great and prosperous lead and zinc region, and surrounded by homes of wealth and culture. Webb City is reached by three railroads and is only a fifteen minutes' ride on the electric cars from Joplin. The property, valued at one hundred thousand dollars, (\$100,000) has fallen into Baptist hands without even costing the denomination a dollar. The circumstances by which it came into our possession certainly point to a providence that makes our trust a sacred one with which we dare not trifle. The building is encumbered by a debt of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), which fell due the first of January last; arrangements, were made by the board of trustees by which the indebtedness may be carried until the first of January next. May the Lord raise up friends to meet that day! The college has an able faculty of ten teachers and an enrollment of more than a hundred students. The courtesy of the college was shown the delegates of the General Association on the evening of October 18, when they were shown through the elegant building of the college, and refreshed in the pleasant dining hall.

La Grange College is presided over by J. T. Muir, LL. D., one of the ablest educators in the state, and whose entire life has been spent in educational work. The territory covered by the college, briefly speaking, is northeast Missouri, reaching as far north as Burlington, Iowa, south to Louisiana, Missouri, and westward to Grand River College, at Gallatin. In this extensive territory live almost 50,000 Baptist people. This year an effort was made to extend its territory into Illinois, which was very successfully done. The new building, increased apparatus, and lessened expense in living, make La Grange College a most desirable school. This year's work promises to be one of the best, if not the best, in the history of the institution. The enrollment exceeds previous years. With added responsibility the needs are greater than before. The good wishes and help of Baptists are desired.

Grand River College, Gallatin, J. H. Hatton, president. This, the 50th session of Grand River College, thus far has been the most successful in its history. One hundred and fifty students are now in attendance. It has a faculty of twelve members. There is offered a two years' preparatory course of study, above which are three collegi-

ate courses, each covering a period of four years' work. There are afforded also a normal course, a business course, courses in art, music and elocution. The property, including grounds, buildings and equipments is worth \$30,000, with a debt of \$4,000. Assistance from the Board in paying off this debt would be appreciated.

Sou hwest Baptist College, Bolivar, Missouri, under the presidency of R. E. L. Burks, has entered upon its twenty-second year with an enrollment to date of 84 students. The institution has no primary department. There are no pupils under sixteen years of age. Its students are collected from four states of our Union. The faculty is composed of eight members, who have been educated in the best colleges and universities of the country.

The college has departments as follows: Preparatory, Collegiate, Normal, Business and Musical.

This school needs a small endowment to enable it to better cultivate the field in the midst of which it is located. The burdens in the past have rested heavily upon the men who have had the work in charge.

Statement of Farmington College. We were enabled last year, by the closest economy, to pay all the running expenses, and have a few dollars over.

We hope to do even better this year. The opening of the school this year was encouraging, there being at least one-third more pupils in the school now than there were at this time last year.

We still owe a debt of \$5,000, upon which we have, until this year, been paying seven per cent, we now pay only six.

We are doing the best we know and need help.

Clarksburg Baptist College is situated in the central part of the state on the main line of the Missouri Pacific Railway and in the center of a most flourishing agricultural community.

It opens with an enrollment of 68 students; is in a prosperous condition with a hopeful future. The educational standard of the school has lately been raised and facilities for more thorough instruction been increased. An effort is at present being made to raise \$5,000 for the erection of additional buildings, and \$2,000 of the sum has already been secured.

Liberty Ladies' College has 100 boarding pupils now in the house with about fifty from town. The school is in splendid working order and the health is perfect, not having had a single case of sickness since the opening of the school.

Western College (Colored), E. L. Scruggs, President.

The schools and colleges of our country are intellectual lighthouses on the sea coast of ignorance. With our churches they have served the demands of a higher, better civilization. The church house and the college building are the permanent tokens of our faith in religion and education. America has been distinguished by the investment of \$295,816,889 in higher education. Baptists have founded 174 colleges, with 2,215 instructors, 33,395 students, and have invested in lands, buildings and endowment \$42,088,444; of this splendid exhibit, Missouri has 13 schools, 144 teachers, 1800 students and \$800,000 invested in property and endowment.

We recommend that the Board of Education be reconstituted so as to consist of one representative from each Baptist school in the state and the remainder of the nineteen (19) to be members at large and that it shall be the duty of this Board for the ensuing year to consider the following points and report at the next meeting of the General Association:

- (1) The federation and affiliation of all our schools
 - (a) On the basis of uniform courses of study in all literary work, the grade of the schools being of course kept in mind.
 - (b) As to the matter of the apportionment of endowment funds raised in the state for educational work.
- (2) To submit as early as possible such a plan of relation, federation, or affiliation as may be agreed upon by the Board, to the Board of Trustees of each Baptist school in the state for acceptance or rejection.
- (3) To consider the following recommendation:

That when five of the schools of the state, two of which must be William Jewell College for young men and Stephens College for young women, shall have accepted the plan submitted, it shall be the duty of this Board to proceed in the work of raising funds to promote the financial interests of the schools so agreeing.

OBITUARIES.

During the past year Brethren Thos. Hanks, of Christian county, G. C. Sparrow, of Macon, D. V. Inlow, of Philadelphia, Mo., B. G. Manard, of Warrensburg, F. W. Houchens, of Independence, and W. R. Rothwell, of Liberty, have entered into their eternal rest. We thank God that such men have lived. The world is better for their having lived in it. May we make their God our God, their Savior our Savior. We humbly pray that the richest blessings of our Heavenly Father may rest upon the bereaved friends and families of these departed servants of Jesus.

Rev. Dudley Vardeman Inlow was born in Bourbon county, Kentucky, November 13, 1820. He began preaching in Missouri when about thirty years of age. He died at his home in Philadelphia, Missouri, May 7, 1899. His son, R. M. Inlow, is pastor at Harrisonville, Missouri. Brother D. V. Inlow was a plain, unassuming man, well versed in the word of God. He was a pioneer preacher, working in new fields, and aiding struggling churches. He worked for the most part in what is now known as Salt River, Bethel, and Mount Salem Associations. Among our strongest bodies now, are churches which he once served and which formerly were very weak. On account of feeble health he did not preach the last years of his life.

Rev. F. W. Houchens was born in Randolph county, Missouri, September 2, 1852. He was converted August 15, 1871; was licensed to preach July 4, 1876, and was ordained June, 1877. From childhood until the time of his death he was an ardent student. He studied a year in Shurtleff College, three years in our State University, three in

Mt. Pleasant College, Huntsville, Missouri, three in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and one year in Harvard Divinity School. He was pastor of several churches in Missouri and Kansas, and one in Oklahoma. He was a scholarly and spiritual preacher. His last charge was at Independence, Missouri, where he won the esteem and love of his people and community. In the language of another: "A cultured Christian gentleman has been taken from the community; a true and tried friend has gone; a tender, loving husband and father has been removed from his family; a faithful pastor and servant of God has gone to his reward."

Rev. W. R. Rothwell was born in Garrard county, Kentucky, but spent most of his life in Missouri. He entered the University of Missouri in 1851. He has been president of Baptist Female College at Columbia, now Stephens College, and of Mount Pleasant College, of Huntsville. Dr. Rothwell was ordained to the gospel ministry in 1860. In the year 1872 he was called to the chair of Theology and Moral Philosophy in William Jewell College and continued therein until God called him home. At one time he was secretary of the General Association of Missouri, and for ten years was chairman of the faculty of William Jewell. He was the author of three books, wrote numerous articles for our religious papers, and made strong addresses on subjects of interest to our denomination. Old students will remember him for his unvarying kindness, and the intimate communion he sustained with God. As a follower of Christ, he endeavored to live the abundant Christian life. He loved the work of teaching and the still more difficult work of investigating. We shall miss him from our assemblies.

Elder Thos. Hanks, of Christian County Association, born March 15, 1816, died October 3, 1899; aged 83 years, six months and seventeen days. A member of the Baptist church seventy years. A minister forty-five years. His life a success; his death a triumph. His last message to the brethren: "Direct your fire more at the enemy and less at each other."

Rev. Birdwell Gibson Manard was born in East Tennessee, in 1842, and died at Warrensburg, Missouri, January 27, 1899, aged 57 years. His early life was spent in securing an education and teaching. He was ordained at Bristol, Virginia, about 1869, and came to Missouri in 1882. For a while he was Sunday School secretary of the state of Arkansas. Was pastor at Marshall, Plattsburg, Holden and Warrensburg, and associate editor of *Word and Way*. Brother Manard was a very spiritual man and very painstaking in everything he undertook. As a preacher he was intensely earnest and forceful. As a pastor he was laborious and attentive to all the spiritual needs of his various charges. Many hearts were made sad when it was reported that he had passed away.

By common consent Rev. J. E. Cook introduced

MISSOURI BAPTIST SANITARIUM.

To the Missouri Baptist General Association:

The Missouri Baptist Sanitarium, in pursuance of its constitution and of standing orders of the Sanitarium Association and the Board of Managers, submits this its ninth annual report to the General Association. The Sanitarium Association is able to report that during the year beginning October 1st, 1898, and ending October 1st, 1899, it has under the blessings of a kind heavenly Father accomplished a large amount of successful work within the scope of the purposes for which it was founded by the Missouri Baptist General Association. During the current year there were housed and treated in the Sanitarium 813 persons. Of these 118 were cared for and treated in the Sanitarium entirely free of charge to the patients. There were besides 82 persons cared for and treated in the Sanitarium as part free patients, making the total of entirely free and part free patients cared for and treated in the Sanitarium during the current year 200. This does not include patients treated free in the dispensary of the Sanitarium, and these amounted to 730. The total number of patients and guests registered in the Sanitarium during the year was 1,055. The charity work done in the Sanitarium during the current year amounted to \$5,688.11; against this the Sanitarium received from the St. Louis Saturday and Sunday Hospital Association \$2,673.93, and through the Woman's Board of Charity of the Sanitarium \$442.24, leaving the net balance of charity work done by the Sanitarium \$2,572.94. During the current year the Sanitarium received in cash donations from divers persons \$3,221.26; and it paid for repairs on the Sanitarium property \$1,259.14, and for interior furnishings \$768.37, for street paving \$665.00, and for interest on its mortgage debt \$2,132.70, or a total sum of \$4,825.21 above current expenses. The current liabilities of the Sanitarium are \$6,852.42. Against this it has cash and bills and accounts receivable amounting to \$7,779.55, leaving a net balance of current assets of \$927.13.

The mortgage debt of the Sanitarium remains unchanged, \$35,000. All the interest on the mortgage debt, which has matured during the current year, has been paid by the liberal donations of a few large hearted brethren. Bro. A. D. Brown, our president, some time since found it in his heart to propose to assume himself and pay off in full the mortgage debt of \$35,000, if a cash endowment of \$50,000 could be raised by January 1st, 1900, and placed at interest, the principal to remain intact and the interest alone to be used from time to time for the Sanitarium. The Sanitarium Association has not yet seen its way clear to raise the endowment of \$50,000.

The Nurses' Training School of the Sanitarium was never in a more flourishing condition than it is at the present time, having now in it thirty pupils.

The Woman's Board of Charity, whose sole purpose is to sustain and enlarge the pure charity work of the institution, has been untiring in its labors during the present year to that end; and they especially appeal directly to their Baptist sisters everywhere for active co-operation and assistance in their labors of mercy and of love for the destitute sick in the Sanitarium.

The Sanitarium Association would lovingly urge upon our great Baptist brotherhood the importance of active and united effort on the part of all of the Baptists of the state to sustain and enlarge the work of the Sanitarium. In the Sanitarium the Baptists of Missouri own one of the finest hospital properties to be found in the whole state; and it may and should become one of the great factors in Baptist work in our state, going hand in hand in our hearts with all of our other Baptist work; and we should not only cherish it for ourselves, but transmit it to our children in succession as one of their best heritages as Missouri Baptists. But the broadest, the best and sweetest prosperity can only come in this unselfish Christlike work by the united efforts of the Baptists of the state to press forward the work of our institutions to larger proportions and to greater usefulness. The Managing Board craves the sympathy, prayers and assistance in their labors of every Baptist in the state.

The Sanitarium Association reports the following vacancies in its body caused by resignation, to-wit: T. J. McLemore, Rev. J. A. M. Crouch and F. H. Luddington; and also reports that the terms of office of the following named members of the Managing Board expire with this month, to-wit: Dr. J. J. Brown, W. F. Elliott, Rev. J. T. M. Johnston, Rev. Dr. A. A. Kendrick, Rev. S. Y. Pitts, Rev. N. R. Pittman and Eugene F. Williams; and the Sanitarium Association requests the Missouri Baptist General Association to nominate successors both in the Sanitarium Association and in the Managing Board to the persons above named.

Everette Gill, on "The Uses of the Sacred Literature Course"; Rev. J. F. Kemper on "The Conquest Missionary Course"; Rev. W. J. Williamson, on "The Junior Union."

Moderator E. W. Stephens again resumed the chair.

Rev. S. G. Neil, of the chapel car "Messenger of Peace," spoke of this feature of the missionary work of the American Baptist Publication Society. An offering of \$123.73 was made. Bro. and Sister Neil sang "Lift the Latch."

Rev. E. H. Sawyer offered a resolution which was adopted:

Resolved, That the cordial thanks of the delegates in attendance upon this Sixty-fifth Anniversary of the Missouri Baptist General Association are extended to Pastor Riggs, and his heroic and hospitable people of the First Baptist Church of Joplin, for the generous entertainment they have furnished; also to the citizens of this enterprising metropolis of southwest Missouri for courtesies received, and to the press for excellent reports of the proceedings of this body.

CONSTITUTION OF THE MISSOURI BAPTIST GENERAL ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. This association shall be called *The Missouri Baptist General Association*.

ART. 2. The object of this association shall be to extend the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ, especially in this state.

ART. 3. The time of this association shall be given to the promotion of its objects in such manner as may be determined by the report of the committee on arrangement of business, when said report has been adopted at each meeting of the association.

ART. 4. There shall be appointed annually committees on the following subjects: *First*, on Religious Exercises; *second*, on Arrangement of Business; *third*, on Nomination of Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools, Board of Home and Foreign Missions, Board of Trustees of William Jewell College, Board of Ministerial Education, Board of Education and Board of Curators of Stephens College; *fourth*, on Religious Publications; *fifth*, on Obituaries; *sixth*, on Baptist Orphans' Home. Of which committees, *fourth*, *fifth* and *sixth* shall be appointed for the year previous to which they are to report, and the moderator may fill all vacancies that may occur during the year.

ART. 5. This association shall be composed of representatives of Baptist churches and associations contributing to its funds and co-operating in its objects, together with such persons as have hitherto been admitted as life members.

ART. 6. Any church of like faith which may contribute ten dollars to the work of the board of state missions and Sunday Schools shall be entitled to a representative and to an additional representative for every five dollars; and every association auxiliary to this body shall be entitled to representation on the same terms as churches, or be entitled to one representative for every one hundred dollars spent in missionary work upon its own field; provided that no church or association shall be entitled to more than five representatives.

ART. 7. All associations auxiliary to this association shall report annually to this body the result of their missionary work, a synopsis of which shall be published with the proceedings of this association.

ART. 8. The state missionary and Sunday School business of this association, during its recess, shall be conducted by a board consisting of a chairman, recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, and fifteen other members, all of whom shall be members in good standing of Baptist churches, who shall be chosen annually and continue in

office until a new election, three members of whom, including one of the officers, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The officers shall perform their duties gratuitously, except the corresponding secretary, who may also act as general agent. Meetings of the board shall be held quarterly, or oftener, if deemed necessary, and special meetings may be called at any time by an officer of the board, of which due notice shall be given. The time and place of the quarterly meetings of the board, for each year, shall be agreed upon at the first meeting of the board, and public notice shall be given of the same. The board may fill all vacancies in their own body during the year.

ART. 9. The board of state missions and Sunday Schools may, from time to time, appoint such missionaries and agents for the prosecution of the legitimate work of this body as they may deem best.

ART. 10. The board of general home and foreign missions, consisting of nineteen members, shall have charge of raising in this state, and of forwarding funds for these missions. It shall have power to choose its own officers and agents, and shall make to the association full annual reports of its operations.

ART. 11. The board of ministerial education shall have power to organize societies for raising means to promote ministerial education in connection with William Jewell College, and shall co-operate with its board of trustees, as far as the college charter may allow, in accomplishing the purpose of this body in founding it. The board of trustees of William Jewell College, and the board of curators of Stephens College, shall report the operations and finances of those institutions at each annual meeting of this body. The board of education shall thoroughly investigate the condition and wants of all our denominational schools in Missouri, and shall have power to organize an auxiliary board of women to aid in raising money, and to raise money to afford temporary relief and to endow any Baptist school in Missouri. The said board of education shall make yearly reports to the association of its doings and of the operations and finances of the schools co-operating with said board of education. The board of education aforesaid shall consist of nineteen members, who shall be elected annually by the association, and shall continue in office until the new board of education is elected.

ART. 12. The preachers employed or aided by this association shall be of good standing and tried piety, and shall belong to some Baptist church in this state.

ART. 13. The association shall meet at such time and place as it may elect.

ART. 14. The officers of this association shall be a moderator, assistant moderator, secretary, assistant secretary, and auditor, who shall be chosen at each annual session. The moderator, assistant mod-

erator, and secretary shall be chosen by ballot, each member casting his own ballot, and by a majority of the ballots cast. The secretary is to appoint his own assistant.

ART. 15. It shall be the duty of the moderator to preside over the body, keep order, take the vote on all questions properly brought up, and perform all other duties common to such officer. It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep correct minutes of all the proceedings of the association, and prepare the same for publication; he may select an assistant. It shall be the duty of the auditor to examine the report of the treasurer of the board of state missions and Sunday Schools, and report on the same to the association.

ART. 16. In case of interruptions in the regular meetings of this body, the board of state missions and Sunday Schools shall have power to call meetings at such time and place as they may think best.

ART. 17. This constitution may be amended only at an annual meeting, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, and notice of such amendments must have been given at the annual meeting preceding.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. The meetings of this association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. In the absence of the moderator and the assistant moderator, the secretary shall call the association to order, and in case the secretary should also be absent, the brother appointed to preach the introductory sermon shall do so, and preside until the association is organized.

3. Any question that may arise, not provided for in the foregoing rules, shall be decided in accordance with "Parliamentary Law," by F. H. Kerfoot, L. B., LL. D.

4. The decision of the moderator on points of order shall stand as the judgment of this body, unless reversed by a vote of the association. Any member shall have a right to appeal from the decision of the chair.

5. The foregoing rules may be altered or amended at an annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.
